# INTRODUCING LAKE COUNTRY PASTEL SOCIETY PRESIDENT, PATRICIA DUNCAN interviewed by kathryn kobs

Patricia Duncan... ballet dancer, choreographer, award winning pastelist and, with a bit of head tilting dissonance, a computer programmer!

This mom of two girls and three boys, the oldest being thirty-three, signed on to preside over the LCPS Board for the next two years, focusing on an appreciation for and continuing application of our founders' mission statement; a focus that reiterates our mutual need of community, to include an emphasis on our wish to give and to receive support in the sharing of our artistic gifts and experiences. Patricia's vision seeks to encourage a revisiting of LCPS's original goals and reasons for coming into being. Why do we exist as a group and how can we, as a society, make our experience more meaningful for each member. By matching our new President's vision with her organizational skills as a computer programmer, arguable the next two years promise a continuation of many good outcomes for LCPS.

Patricia Duncan, born in the small town of Flandreau, South Dakota, recalls her first artistic promptings being due to the creativity and encouragement of her second grade teacher. She attended both grade and high school in Flandreau until matriculating to the University of Utah to major in the performing arts. Patricia received her MFA in Ballet, mastering both dance and choreography, performing in a professional ballet company called the "Ballet West, Utah." Eventually Patricia turned her talents to teaching ballet for a private dance academy along with personal tutoring.

Arriving in Minnesota, Patricia returned to school for the purpose of obtaining a degree in computer programming. Upon completion she found employment with Cenex, Corporation. Somewhere during these years she married her childhood sweetheart from Flandreau, South Dakota. When her first child came along, Patricia devoted full time to raising this child and the four babies to follow. She is a grandmother to four and loves the privilege. During these years, Patricia and her husband Ken Duncan devoted themselves to their Biblical faith and their children. Painting, although still a rustic interest in the recesses of Patricia's mind, remained relativity dormant. But then about fifteen years ago, she took classes in drawing and pastels at the Edina Art Center and the rest is history.

Now as an award winning artist with eclectic painting interests, she is ribboned in portraits and other subjects. Patricia often paints out of her studio in Wisconsin and currently studies under Joe Paquet and Jeff Hurinenko in oil painting, where she met and struck up a friendship with our outgoing President, Cheryl LeClair-Sommer. And Although Patricia became a member of LCPS about five years ago, it was only a tangential involvement until her association with Cheryl culminated in her willingness to become our new President.

Recently Patricia won the top pastelist award at the Elk River Arts Alliance show and the first and second prize, awarded by Fred Somers, at the Savage show last June. She also received an honorable mention at the St. Benedictine Monastery in Maplewood at their Sacred Art Exhibit. She is currently working on a commissioned painting of Christ.

Asked if her faith informed her art, Patricia answered that art to her is a sacred experience. Wondering if she might elaborate, she noted that painting or dancing--art per se--is a meditative affair and therefore entails elements of the spiritual.

To paraphrase Patricia's summation of her painting experience, she stated that art is a means of expressing and communicating ourselves--a truly intimate process. We see, then, just how personal is Patricia's LCPS mission purpose emphasis, which is to share support and the communication of ourselves through our creativity---pretty much what painting is to her every time.

He stated that the best pieces are beautiful and draw you in – particularly in landscapes, the viewer feels that they have participated in the landscape. He stated that art can represent beauty and doesn't require angst or social comment to be vital. The best art, in Curt's opinion, is spiritual and brings the viewer to a special place.

I was personally happy that the juror/judge expressed his opinion publicly that visual art can simply represent beauty. This aspiration as a goal in visual art has not always been lauded in the contemporary art world.

#### JANUARY LCPS PROGRAM NOTES

LCPS members enjoyed a double feature for January's meeting program thanks to LCPS's Lisa Stauffer and Wet Paint Artist Materials and Framing of St. Paul.

For her feature, Lisa assembled a range of pastel papers and hard-to-soft pastels from several makers. Attendees were invited to test their favorite techniques with these samples to help decide future purchases or upgrades to their materials. Canson, Strathmore, Wallis, and the full range of UArt textured papers (240, 300, 400 500, 600, and 800) were among the papers on hand; Girault, Sennelier, Unison, Rembrandt, Ludwig, and NuArt among the pastels. A helpful guide listed various pastel brands on a scale from soft to hard. Lisa also displayed assorted boxed sets of Girault, Dakota, and Ludwig pastels for inspection or purchase.

For the second feature, Wet Paint general manager Darin Rinne and associate Kate Ratzer showcased a sample of new products, popular products, and paper stock on closeout. Among the featured products:

<u>Viarco (Art Graf) Water-Soluble Carbon Coin</u>. This thin briquette of compressed carbon from Portugal was inspired by the white chalk wafers used by tailors. The edges can create both crisp lines lengthwise and broad tones widthwise. The Art Graf coin is substantially harder than vine charcoal, charcoal stick, or charcoal pencil but not as hard as graphite. The intensity of gray and black shades will vary with pressure and the surface to which the carbon is applied. What's more, the carbon can be converted to a permanent wash when moistened with water from a brush or sponge. From my own trials I found the coin edges gave a crisp line and held up well without the need for repeated reshaping. It performed best with toothed papers such as UArt, good with Strathmore and Canson, but only fair-to-poor with newsprint. I also found the carbon will indeed affix permanently to paper and other surfaces (including my denim jeans) once moistened and dried.

<u>Strathmore Toned 400-series medium-surfaced Sketch Pads</u> available in toned gray and toned tan pads sizes 5.5"x8.5", 9"x12", 11"x14", and 18"x24". These provide a good mid-range base for developing a range of dry media drawings with lighter and darker values. <u>Richeson Soft Pastels</u>-- hand-rolled in boxed sets of 12 full-sticks or 24 half-sticks-- are notable

for Unison pastel quality at a more affordable price. <u>Schminke Horadam 12 half-pan watercolors.</u> This compact limited-edition set was produced to Wet Paint specs and has been popular both in-store and on-line through a couple reorders. <u>Lascaux Spray Fixative.</u> Although expensive, this fixative is noted for clarity and workability. Only 1-2 light layers are needed in most cases.

<u>Dual Brush Pens.</u> These brush-like markers are available in sets for landscapes, portraits, and gray tones.

<u>Sílícone spreader.</u> This versatile item falls into the "Hey, I can use this for \_\_\_\_\_!" category. The palm-sized flexible spreader has found uses in place of brush or trowel by some painters. <u>Mucacious Iron Oxide.</u> On hand by popular request from the last LCPS program.

After door prize drawings, attendees swarmed both feature displays in a shopping and sampling frenzy for the remainder of program time. Samples of Richeson pastels, Milan duo pencil erasers, UArt sandpaper shaper sticks, and Richeson Unison Gator Foam pastel surfaces, were among other items available for attendees to take home.

The convention features demonstrations by nationally and internationally known pastel artists, hands on workshops, the opportunity to meet pastel artists from all over the world, to see and try out new products, and to purchase products in the vendor area. The convention is such a great time – by signing up early, you will have the greatest chance of attending the classes and demonstrations that you are most interested in.

The Prospectuses for the Twenty-Second Juried Exhibition and the Second Master Circle Exhibition are now available for download. You can read class descriptions, instructor information, and find out everything you need to know to plan your convention experience. You can also make your hotel reservations online. Entry is online only, and the entry deadline is <u>March 22</u>. When you start to think about your travel plans, be sure to consider the pre-convention one- and two-day workshops, and the post-convention two-day workshops. Also, the exhibitions will open on June 5, (Wednesday evening). IAPS has been working on plans to bring the exhibitions into the hotel, and at this point IAPS is 95% certain that is going to happen. In addition to the opening reception on June 5, the exhibition will be open throughout the convention, so everyone will be able to enjoy it without leaving the hotel.

Other artists frequently ask me how I find out about the many visual arts opportunities available in our community. While I have many sources to draw from, I mainly obtain information about opportunities within the state of Minnesota through MNArtists.org. This website provides, in part, information about various artist opportunities that are not merely limited to visual art. On your internet browser, type in: <u>mnartists.org</u>. Click on News/Opportunities. You will find a recent listing of opportunities, which can include exhibit opportunities, job opportunities, studio rentals, residencies, etc. I suggest you check frequently. When I recently checked it out, I found the following: TLC is sponsoring its 4th annual Emerging Artists Program. This program subsidizes 2 week-long residencies for 7 emerging artists from Minnesota and 5 NYC boroughs - a stipend is provided. Wow - stay at a great northern MN location and get paid to create art. Does it get any better?

# Calendar and Exhibit Details

Once you subscribe to various email notifications, you will need to sift through the information carefully. Be careful about the due dates, exhibition fees, shipping fees, etc. Does the exhibit call for exhibiting one work or are you asking for a solo exhibition? Ask yourself if the opportunity is geared toward the type of work you create (check out the background of the judge, if named)? Is this the type of venue that fits within your immediate artistic goals? What are the potential prizes or awards? Be sure to maintain a calendar of exhibits and to be careful not to overlap venues where you are exhibiting the same piece (if you plan to exhibit the same piece in two successive exhibits, the piece should be listed as NFS in the first exhibit).

# Receive emails

Another great way to find out about artist opportunities is to subscribe to receive emails from the many exhibit spaces and galleries in your community, i.e. Hopkins Center for the Arts has a call for visual art exhibitions that is due soon. Another rich source of information is found by subscribing to email subscriptions at museums and private art centers, i.e. The Crossings at Carnegie. You will receive periodic emails that may fit your needs for both educational and/or exhibition opportunities.

#### When traveling

If you are interested in traveling to a certain area, check on-line for information about their art galleries, plein air exhibits, museums, and art centers. You may find exhibition and event opportunities in that area that may correspond with your travel dates.

Websites are available that feature national exhibitions/calls for entries, such as: <u>ArtShow.com</u>. This website contains information on calls for entry nationally, which normally requires you to ship your

# Keep It Simple

Easier said than done! So much of painting is being able to see it simply, then paint it simply. Whenever we get mired in the thick of it, going back to the simplest solution seems the way to head. But painting is complex, which by the way is the beauty of it; the mix of boldness and nuance, intensity and subtly. This is what is most attractive and challenging about the activity. So, how do we tease out the important bits, get them down and succinctly

Making anything simple is an art in itself. I am easily overwhelmed by tasks, and tend to make things harder than they need to be. This even extends to my studio set-up. For years I had the table that my pastel palette rests on, pushed against the wall making it two long steps from my easel. Finally the day came when it dawned on me that it would be infinitesimally easier if I just pulled the table towards the easel! We fall into routine and habit that could be making things harder, not easier. Challenging these habits is a good thing. I try to remember that I want to make poems, not novels.

The same goes for the painting process. Are there habits and biases that are making things harder? Ideas, like 'it's not ok to use black' or 'you should always start with the darkest darks' or 'you should work top to bottom in pastel'. You have to figure out what makes it simple for YOU. Adopting another artist's method without really checking out whether this is for you is folly. Trying new stuff on for size, sure, but don't do it blindly

Even starting can get you down. Choosing from the myriad of materials available then amassing them, deciding what to paint, especially if you have lots of ideas and then carving out time to get going.

For me, I try to make sure I know why I am painting something, first and foremost. Is it the color, gesture, mood that has me enchanted? What do I want to say with the work? Then I can always point back to that simple idea when I get stuck. When breaking down the components of a painting, I start with the biggest and easiest shapes and block those in quickly. Simple to complex. This way I get to see how the whole is working really fast and I build on what is working. I try not to get stuck on what isn't resolved yet. I can work on something a long time and get that done eventually. I can also paint over something multiple times, so getting it right the first time isn't my primary objective.

Holding the idea that something is hard to do, sets you up for procrastination and avoidance of it. Better to dive in and figure it out than not do it at all. Just keep painting. Believe it is simple, see it simple. KEEP IT SIMPLE!!! SO SIMPLE!!!
