Detours are a predictable part of our Minnesota or Wisconsin summers, whether for road construction or for special events such as a town festival or the Edina Art Fair. They often take us onto unfamiliar streets, through unique neighborhoods, down remote county roads, or back onto the "old highway". Some things new, some things old.

Short-term detours often portend long-term changes. Better pavement or more lanes. Easier curves and grades. A new bridge or bypass. Advances in safety, always. They also can spell removal of landmarks, changes to landscapes, and changes to a local culture.

For instance, work on Hwy 100 will replace bridges that kept more lanes from being added, but will raze stone picnic tables and grills on grass shoulders built as part of Lilac Parkway in the late 1930's. Or drive Wisconsin Hwy 35 between Stillwater and Hudson. Note where the new St Croix River Bridge will pierce what are now wooded bluffs and farm fields. Now transpose an image of commercial Hudson along 1-94 or commercial Hwy 36 Stillwater onto that landscape to envision major culture change.

Detours can be an irritant...or something else. We might choose to see, snapshot, or sketch these scenes or features—both new and old-if we're not driving, not pre-occupied, or not mere inches from the bumpers of adjacent vehicles. Some might be subjects for future paintings. All will tell a story.

And, if we're lucky, we'll notice and return to explore and paint when there's more time and less traffic. If not, we can't or won't, and the traces will vanish. Or-hopefully-be recorded by others.

Detours. Angst or Opportunity? Up to you.

### May Program report

#### May program - Mentoring and Critiques

The majority of our May 12th meeting time was split in two. The first part dealt with reports on the Mentoring Program, as well as exhibiting some of participants' projects; the second with critiquing work that members bravely brought for this purpose. It was a busy evening and the hours zipped by!

Some notes on the past year's Mentoring Program:

- There were eight mentors and eleven "mentees." Some members participated in both areas.

- Pairs met at coffee shops, studios, or connected via e-mailed images/advice. It was good to hear about the various ways they could gain access to each other. Number of times connecting through the year seemed to be decided upon by each team.

Some things learned by those participating:

- You may edit when working from photographs.
- Information about shows and products.
- You don't have to paint exactly what you see.
- The program created a Safe Environment in which to share.

The LCPS now has a list of waiting "mentees" but is in need of mentors. It sounds like an Excellent Adventure if you are so inclined!

The second portion of the meeting had us counting off by fives and forming into small groups around the perimeter of the room. We'd earlier set our pastel work at five areas along the walls, and when instructed, each group took approximately ten minutes to discuss each section's offerings.

Speaking only for our group we enjoyed seeing the wide variety of pastels presented. Some were obviously in early stages, others were meticulously finished. It was good to hear the comments of each person in our group, but it felt odd knowing that there was no way of communicating to a particular artist what we were discussing. We agreed that our next group critique should include small pieces of paper, perhaps

index cards,?, on which we can write compliments, questions, and/or suggestions. This way each artist could come away knowing what every member thought of his or her work.

The evening passed quickly, and each portion of the meeting felt equally educational. Well, done, all!

#### A few memories from the IAPS Banquet Speaker, Esther Bell, PhD, a specialist in 17th- and 18th-century European painting

Preliminary note: This is by no means a thorough replay of the presentation and others are invited to add their thoughts. The speaker, a friend of Pastel Journal editor Anne Hevener, plans to publish her findings in the future.

Art historian and museum curator, Dr. Bell, began her brief but detailed history of pastel painting in Europe by describing an exhibition in 1746 when pastel painting, which had previously been used primarily for sketching, began to be used to create vibrant portraits of noble and wealthy clients. (Some of those18th- and 19th-century pastel portraits are occasionally on view at the Minneapolis Institute of Art).

By 1789, those same artists had to flee for their lives as the culture of the French Revolution associated pastel paintings with the "bourgeoisie." In France pastels became a medium for political cartoons while portrait artists were forced into exile.

A century later as artists adjusted to their changing world and Impressionism became the vocabulary of the day, 21 artists gathered together to form a Pastel Society. Rule 23 of their society guidelines was that they "would not disparage the old masters." In 1886 the organization described pastels as "true painting."

Dr. Bell discussed the publications of George Pettit, who was a great champion of Monet, Cezanne, Renoir, Degas and other Impressionists. With 1500 colors available, there was a revival of fine artists' interest in the pastel medium. Artists used mounted paper or worked directly on canvas, some as large as 4 x 5 feet. Degas and others were pushing the medium by applying a thick paste of pastel to canvas for an impasto effect. They used oil and turpentine over pastel, combined pastel painting and gouache on metal plates, and used pastels in mono-printing. Some trials were more successful than others.

Post Script: It is no surprise that Fred Somers was especially intrigued by the stories of artist's experiments with the pastel medium. He commented that we are now experiencing a third revival of pastel painting, with pioneers like Flora B. Giffuni at Pastel Society of America and Urania Christy Tarbet founding IAPS. They have opened doors for us to exhibit and manufacturers have introduced such an abundance of new equipment materials and colors that today's pastel paintings are more exciting and luminous than ever before. Pastels are once again "true painting."
