A CHANGE IN PRESCRIPTION

As artists, I'm sure none of us take our vision for granted. Yet that gratitude doesn't come easy for many. In my case, the correction process for astigmatism and nearsightedness saddled my nose with thick and thicker glasses



from second grade into my mid-20's along with the youthful taunting they often attract. Fortunately, my budget and advances in contact lenses aligned in 1983 to allow a switch to gas-permeable hard lenses. Ensuing years of complacency ended in 2002 and 2006 with detaching retinas in both eyes. Prompt action by the outstanding eye surgeons and staff at the Minneapolis Eye Institute preserved my vision, for which I'm forever grateful. Later in 2006, they performed cataract surgery that removed the last traces of astigmatism and nearsightedness to give me the best vision I ever had. Yet, we age. Since 2015, I noticed my vision became less acute, especially when reading signs or distant screens. When it reached the point where I kept asking Jean to read me the closed captions on our Netflix videos, I knew it was time for a check-up and new prescription.

A change in prescription is not limited to our eyes. Audiophiles discover that their ears become more discerning of distortion and frequencies over time. In response, they seek peer reviews or professional advice and buy more refined—and expensive—equipment (e.g. Bang and Olufsen). The same goes for woodworkers and their tools, or musicians and their instruments. We sense a growing discomfort, pain, or "dis-ease" in some part of our lives or pursuits...and we seek advice and ways to address it.

Likewise, in our world of pastel painting, an art form hundreds of years old, we frequently face hurtles or issues that need a new prescription of sorts. For me, I've noticed my trusty Rembrandts are not the "soft" pastels they claim to be. My pastel prescription will be to buy a set of Senneliers, Ludwigs, or Giraults to give me the buttery soft pigments I seek for some later passages in my paintings. Jean's generous birthday gift card to me from Wet Paint is just what the doctor ordered!

There are many ways to address our pastel "dis-ease" besides "buying" the solution. Yes, workshops, classes, videos, books, and magazine articles will certainly help, but our annual peer review meeting and mentoring programs at LCPS can pay big dividends. If nothing else, we can get informal support from our LCPS peers. Granted, a prescription may include different equipment, pastels, or surfaces, but it may also call for a graduated series of classes, more training, or a rigorous painting schedule. None may be easy or yield immediate results.

Notes from September meeting

Our September meeting found us in Cynthia Kath's studio, located in Minneapolis, Minnesota's Northrup King Building.

Most of the evening was taken up with Marc Hanson demonstrating some of the methods he uses in creating his pastel paintings.

Viewing a small oil paint landscape study as initial inspiration, Hanson used a big piece of vine charcoal to lay in basic shapes on a La Cart surface. (I cannot remember if it was paper or board.)

Bits and pieces, and quotes from the demo - mostly in order:

- He blocks in shapes with black or dark brown, and over-lays other colors over initial ones.

- "Don't look at trees as trees - look at them as shapes."

- "If I'm worried about what the actual thing is, I'll get in trouble."

- Hanson first painted as a Naturalist. Now he is freed from worrying about what kinds of trees he is painting.

- He uses sides of pastels to block in much of the piece; trying for loose, quick marks.

- To catch pastel bits/dust, Hanson places a small rain gutter at the bottom of his easel. He found his gutter at Home Depot.

- He laid in a light green area quite intensely - knowing some of the pastel was going to be knocked off in the next step.

- Hanson is always thinking of warms and cools in colors. He said, "In Texas the green is full of red.'

- On painting a landscape: "What I painted is not a duplicate of what was there."

- The actual painting he worked on differed from the study. Hanson did not care to make an exact copy of his original sketch.

- He then began using little, light, wispy marks, and pastel pencils, to glaze areas and to get shapes to relate more to each other.

- "You have to discover what the painting has."

- He was looking for "little notes of authenticity" toward the end.

- Marks on painting kept getting smaller and smaller, finishing with "little notes to make it real."

- Hanson added a a bit more purple, said, "I'm done," and knocked the finished piece on the table to remove loose bits of pastel.

- He prefers to use no fixatives.

- Hanson suggested to us finding a person or small group to meet with regularly as trusted critics, and said these sessions work best if people are gentle, yet truthful.

- And sometime during his excellent demonstration Marc Hanson stated, "Eventually, you have to decide to be the artist."

We were invited to ask questions while Hanson was working, and afterward, more closely inspect the finished landscape painting.

all in all, an evening well spent, in a building filled with creativity.

The workshop will be held on Tuesday through Friday, May 2-5, 2017. Fred is an IAPA' Master pastel painter and what a thrill it is for the LCPS to be a part of this event.

4 day Pastel Workshop (studio & plein air)

Awaken the sparks of your creativity with IAPS' Master and Eminent Pastellist, Frederick Somers .

Fred will establish a solid foundation to work with the traditional landscape. In plein air demo he will explore how we see vs. how a camera 'sees.' Introducing his unique uses of materials he will show us some new techniques he has been working with including hints about using gold leaf. Demos and slide shows give tools to enhance each student's artistic identity.

His own work is very expressive, often focusing on close up details with an abstract sensibility. He has a very reassuring manner as well as inspiring and interesting insights on art making. All student painting will be conducted indoors. Some experience in painting is recommended but all levels of experience are welcome. Certificates of Participation are available for educators.
