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From the President



SO MANY QUESTIONS, SO FEW ANSWERS

I was recently speaking with a very bright and ambitious Museum Studies student at University of Denver (she is a full-time Masters student AND works at three local contemporary museums!) She told me that across the country museum attendance fell during the Covid 19 pandemic and has yet to return to pre-pandemic levels. A quick Google

search indicated that our local MIA and WALKER museums report the same sluggish return to normal visitation.

For days I have ruminated on this. Why are people not returning to museums? Why do people go to museums in the first place? Why do I go to art museums? What would it take to lure old patrons back and how can new patrons be enticed to visit?

Part of our art museum conversation included a description of the current exhibitions in town that she was very excited about. They included:

- Museum of Contemporary Art Denver The Future is Present, The Harbinger is
 Home: Through this exhibition audiences are invited to explore the role of New
 Orleans and other climate-vulnerable regions of the world, as points of departure for
 examining our collective future as it relates to climate change, legacies of colonialism, and definitions of belonging and home.
- Denver Art Museum an exhibition by Kent Monkman "History is Painted by the Victors". Monkman is known for his provocative interventions into Western European and American art history. Through his painting, Monkman pushes forward an understanding of the lived experiences of Indigenous people today while confronting colonial injustices. This exhibition contains depictions of violence and nudity.

And the rest of the story. This Denver visit was with my husband and two sons (ages 25 and 27.) During our three day stay we visited the Denver Zoo, went to a Colorado Rockies baseball game and visited the Wings Over the Rockies Air and Space Museum.

Now, you might be thinking – "oh, I get it – it was more about what they wanted to do." But no, it was just that neither of those exhibits interested me. Why? I have given this a great deal of thought and have come up with a few solid reasons and a few vague gut feelings. But bottom-line, when given the choice of activities, the museums didn't make the list this time. How about you? Do one or both of these intrigue you enough to visit (assuming you're visiting Denver)? Why or why not?

What types of exhibits DO interest me? Others? What are the most visited exhibits at MIA? The Vikings" drew 212,956 visitors, "Impressionism" Selections from Five American Museums (155,198) and China's Terracotta Warriors: The First Emperor's Legacy 146,507 visitors! And if you've ever attended their Art In Bloom exhibit you can't deny its popularity. The Walker Art Center's most popular permanent collection is Franz Marc's "Die grossen blauen Pferde (The Large Blue Horses). When was your last museum visit and what drew you there? Do you have a favorite local Twin Cities museum? Is there a museum you avoid, and if so, why?

A different thought - not entirely unrelated! Same visit, my son had a gathering of friends at his home and he introduced me to a friend who enjoys making digital art. Another friend approached who enjoys painting portraits of famous people. We obviously share a passion for art. I wished I had asked them if either of them have visited the Denver museums of late. Is the very fact that we didn't talk about the local museums an interesting point?

Another thought - also not entirely unrelated! My current "art read" is Zen in the Art of Writing by Ray Bradbury. In the chapter of the same title he discusses the process of making art for its own sake rather than in pursuit of money or fame. He states "that to do so you are either making art to please a tiny audience that can only beat an Idea insensible and then to death, or a large audience that wouldn't know an Idea if it came up and bit them."

Who do you think he is talking about? Is the answer to some of the questions asked earlier, somewhere in the chasm between these two?

Well, now I leave you with all of these unanswered questions and one poem.

With Yorick's mouth cry, "Thanks!" to Art.






Upcoming Events

Many people work with outdoor scenes, but have you ever tried doing a still life painting? Or even had questions about doing the background for it, objects to use, starting with an underpainting, etc. Come to this meeting and hear what options and techniques Kathe Drake uses when she does her still life paintings. Her presentation will include home marketing techniques, subject matter, background choices and more.



Kathe Drake is an award-winning pastel and oil painter. Like many artists, she has been creating art since childhood. She graduated from the University of Minnesota with a minor in art and furthered her studies at the Minnesota River School of Fine Art, where she went on to teach pastel painting. Most of Kathe's work is created directly from life. She is particularly drawn to feminine subjects - women and their clothing as well as to flowers, fruits and vegetables. Even common place objects gain significance when carefully viewed and incorporated into her still life's. She says "because the visual world is so rich with possibilities, I find there are endless variation to capture in all that I see."

Kathe's work has been in several national and international shows.

She will have three of her paintings in the LCPS exhibit coming up at the

Frameworks Gallery in Highland Park of St. Paul. So, do come to her presentation and learn more about Still Life painting.

November 10, Cheri Ginsburg demo with PanPastel

Cheri Ginsburg is an award-winning pastel, pen & ink artist, and sculptor. Ginsburg's extensive travels throughout North America, Europe, Costa Rica and parts of Africa, as well as her fondness for the American Southwest and home state of Nebraska, influence her work as she experiments with bringing her interpreted landscapes to life with exquisite color and detail. Her work is often recognized by a sense of tranquil serenity regardless of subject matter or medium. In her own words she says: "Having come from a background of stone and bronze sculpture; I was instantly intrigued by the hands on feel of working with pastel. Then, totally by accident, I discovered PanPastel while looking for a blacker black... and something clicked. The colors were yummy, I liked the ease of using the pallets, and the tools gave me that sculptural feeling I missed from my stone sculpting days. And then there was that soft effect I loved. And the rest is history."

Members Meeting

Lorenzo Chavez Workshop Overview

This past May we were privileged to experience an amazing workshop taught by Lorenzo Chavez from Colorado. Our excitement was high and he did not disappoint! From start to finish Lorenzo shared his knowledge and expertise with humbleness and warmth.

Lorenzo brought us back to the basics from the get go by taking a deep dive into composition, shapes, value, edges, line, texture and color. He emphasized the importance of thumbnail sketches and studies to really hone in on how a painting will be set up. He mentioned that in many of his paintings he spends most of his time in the planning and underpainting stages. Notan sketches can be an invaluable tool to assist with basic structure and shapes. Variety in shapes adds interest! We don't want our shapes to be the same size since that captures the eye for all the wrong reasons. It's also important to figure out where your center of interest is and to plan how you will lead the viewers eye through the painting. Two of Lorenzo's favorite books on composition are "Elementary Principles of Landscape Painting" by John F. Carlson and "Composition of Outdoor Painting" by Edgar Payne.







Lorenzo's years of experience painting outdoors is apparent in his understanding of light, edges and color in landscapes. He talked about the 3 types of light; direct light, sky light and reflected light and how they react and shift on flat plains and upright plains. Fun tip! The blue of the sky is always in the shadows; flat plains in shadow have the strongest blues and upright plains in shadow have less blue. There is so much to see and experience in nature. Most of the subtle beauty that the eye can capture in the shadows and the delicate shift in values and edges is totally lost when looking at a photo. How can you paint how an edge "feels" from a photo? Lorenzo couldn't stress enough the importance of painting outside so one can really experience and see the colors and values from life. It will take everyone's paintings to the next level for sure!

Lorenzo also shared some fascinating insights about color and the shifts that happen as our view goes off into the distance. Atmospheric perspective here we come! Did you know yellow is the quickest color to fade as you look into the distance? Yellow will change to yellow/violet and change to blue/gray as it goes into the distance. Blue will be steady. Red goes from yellow/red to red/blue to muted violets. An overcast day has warm shadows and cool sunlight vs. a sunny day which has cool shadows and warm sunlight. So much to learn, see and REMEMBER!



Throughout the entire 3 days, Lorenzo kept bringing us back the basics of composition and it was the theme of the workshop as he assisted everyone with their paintings and pushed us to consider those important elements. Where is your focal point? How are your shapes; is there variety? Are you creating the feeling of distance? Is your mark making and line work directing the viewer's eye to where you want it to go? Get some blue in your shadows! Check out artist, Tara Will, for a great example of line work.

We were all in agreement that Lorenzo really helped us to see and use composition principles. His passionate enthusiasm for nature and painting was evident as he painted and taught. It was a joy to behold! It's evident that he is living one of his favorite quotes. "When you follow your bliss, doors will open." Joseph Campbell

RECAP OF THE MAY DEMO

There were 25 people who attended the Lorenzo Chavez demo on May 15. Lorenzo jumped right into it with an image of a familiar and favorite location of his. He did refer to the tools he primarily uses when he is doing pleine air painting. His pastels were primarily Rembrandt with a few tertiary colors. His primary paper is made by Hanson. He does vary the color of paper on occasion, but they would be mostly a warm grade, which is a good undertone for his works.





He divides his paper into thirds, both horizontally and vertically, since spacing is very important for him. This techniques came primarily from his portrait days. He looks at both the positive and negative spaces of his elements in the picture. He also looks for variations in his drawing, because he is not wanting to do a duplicate of his image. The focus is on the shapes in the picture. When he works with clouds, he wants them to be different shapes. He does add and subtract elements while he is painting, but mostly it's subtraction. One does not have to copy exactly what they see. On occasion he will use a paper towel to help spread the pigment around. He moves the pigment around for texture and to be a foundation, but not for anything in particular. He tends to start with the dark colors, but in this case, he began with the mild tones.







After having painted for awhile he tends to look for what is dark, medium and light in his painting. As he said: "Value does all the work, but color gets the credit." What he has noticed in his pleine air experiences, is that distant whites are actually warmer than the closer whites, when it comes to clouds. He does pleine air painting for the direct experience and connection with nature. When you are sketching in nature, it is more to gather knowledge and information. He does not consider it a work of art. When he paints in the studio, it is more an exercise of remembering what you can of the original experience. He did answer questions as he worked on his painting. One response was to practice doing clouds on small pieces of paper. Practice as often as you can.


FRED SOMERS WORKSHOP OCTOBER 13, 14 & 15, 2025

'Paint what you love, walk in the light." ~Fred Somers

The Lake Country Pastel Society is excited to announce that our very own Fred Somers will be teaching a three day in-studio workshop Monday-Wednesday, October 13-15, 2025. It will be held in his home studio near Northfield, MN.

Fred has painted in pastels for almost 50 years and has been a member of LCPS since its beginning 25 years ago. After teaching drawing, painting and printmaking at St. Olaf and Carlton College, he moved to his farm home studio and began his adventure as a freelance artist, painting in pastel and oil. His paintings, known for their peaceful sensitivity, reflect themes from the land. In Fred's

words, "I love painting woods, fields and streams, interpreting vistas and intimate views." He incorporates goldleaf into many of his paintings, giving a luminosity unique to Fred's work. His pastel paintings of the Big Woods State Park, which is near his home, were chosen for the 1996 Minnesota State Park permit design. Fred continues painting as well as teaching workshops throughout the US and in Sweden.



This will be a hands-on workshop with demonstrations, slide presentations and plenty of one-on-one instruction. Fred will introduce materials and techniques that he has developed, including dry drawn and wet poured pastel pigment. Students will explore new ways of seeing that can enhance each individual's style. There may also be an opportunity to do some plein air painting.

Working in Fred's studio and gallery, students will be surrounded by his beautiful paintings and immersed in his creative space. An inspiration in and of itself, this will truly enhance the learning experience. Having painted full-time from this farm site since 1975, Fred proudly states, "Painting this rural place I call home, this one spot where I've been planted like a tree, by the streams of water, I paint what I love, I walk in the light."


